<u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of the Competitive Sonatina Festival is to encourage the performance of sonatinas and sonatas, to foster the understanding of the sonata form in music, and to give performance experience. Vocal students and beginning and intermediate strings may choose contrasting repertoire from different historical eras.

Registration requirements

- 1. All PPMTA General and Festival Standing Rules apply to this event.
- 2. Submit:
 - a. Online entries:

 - Online registration includes payment.
 - Deadline: 5:00 PM February 1, 2024.
 - b. Signed forms to be sent to Ara Gevorkian (2165 Hollow Brook Dr., Suite 50, Colorado Springs 80918) must be received no later than February 24, 2024:
 - Festival Agreement Form for each student.
 - <u>Music Release Form</u> is required only if a student is using photocopied or downloaded free sheet music.
- 3. Teachers must be available to work Saturday, March 2, 2024 or provide the chair with a PPMTA teacher as a substitute.
- 4. Teachers will receive their student schedules, work assignments, as well as notification of winners by email.

Piano:

Refer to the approved PPMTA Sonatina List following this festival description and also available at http://www.ppmta.org/ppmta-student-activities.html. Class levels, their descriptions, and requirements are on the list. A teacher may enter a Primer through Class II student with a sonatina not on the list but must contact Ara Gevorkian at aragevorkian@icloud.com or (719) 749-8498 before deciding to enter the sonatina. The chair will then determine the class level of the unlisted sonatina. Repeats may be taken in Primer Class through Class II only. Teachers may elect to place a student in a higher level, but not a level lower than their age.

EVALUATION ONLY is offered to piano students. Sonatinas are chosen from the same approved PPMTA list referenced above. Should the teacher want an opportunity to become more familiar with this festival, or the student prefer to only be evaluated, this will allow for the standard evaluation to be done without competing. THIS OPTION MUST BE INDICATED AT THE TIME OF REGISTERING ONLINE. No student may change class or opt for evaluation once registration is complete. A teacher entering students for "EVALUATION ONLY" must contact Ara Gevorkian at aragevorkian@icloud.com or (719) 749-8498 with student names before registering the students.

Voice:

Age-appropriate songs from material such as folk songs, art songs, Italian arias, or theater songs from legitimate music theater productions and musicals.

Each student will perform from memory two songs from two contrasting periods of music history. Students in Primer and Class I may perform two songs from the same period if they contrast in style. Class III-V students are strongly encouraged to sing one song in a foreign language. Teachers may accompany their students.

<u>Instrumental:</u> (strings, brass, and woodwinds)

BRASS AND WOODWINDS: Instrumentalists are to choose a sonata for the specific instrument. There is no specific list of approved composers or sonatas. A sonata using a similar number of movements as the same age level in piano is appropriate. At least one movement must be memorized. Total time for set up, tuning, and the performance is not to exceed the allotted time.

STRINGS: Beginners and intermediate students shall play two memorized, contrasting (one slow, one fast) pieces (no Pop/Celtic). Advanced students should play a sonata from the standard repertoire for their instrument with their collaborative pianist. At least one movement must be memorized. Total time for set up, tuning, and the performance is not to exceed the allotted time.

Student Ensembles:

Consists of two or more student performers in any combination of disciplines such as piano or voice duets/trios/quartets, keyboard ensembles, and instrumentalists. Duo Piano entries cannot be accommodated. Teachers may accompany their students, but only student accompanists will be adjudicated as part of the ensemble. Students may perform with music. All non-vocal ensemble entries are to choose repertoire from sonatinas or sonatas. There is no specific list of approved composers or sonatas. A sonata using a similar number of movements as the same age level in piano is appropriate.

- 1. Age is determined as of February 1, 2024. Ensemble Classes will be based on the age of the oldest student member of the group as of February 1, 2024.
- 2. Piano, Voice, Instrumental and Ensemble Codes are: P = Piano; V = Voice; E = Ensemble; S = Strings; W = Woodwinds; B = Brass
- 3. Music must be provided for the judge. All entrants and accompanists must abide by the Federal Copyright Law. Photocopies are strongly discouraged. Entrants and accompanists using photocopies or PDFs downloaded from the internet will be required to complete the Music Release Form verifying that they have permission to use this music. - 4. Auditions will be open to students and parents, and others where space permits. PPMTA teachers are encouraged to observe in order to learn how to better prepare students.
- 5. Each student will receive a written evaluation and a certificate of participation. Judges will give a rating of: Highly Superior, Superior, Excellent, or Good.
- 6. The judges may choose up to three winners and two honorable mentions in each class. Teachers will be notified by email of their students' results and of the piece selected by the judges to be performed at the Winner Recitals on Sunday. Each teacher is responsible for notifying their winning students of the selection to be performed and the time and place of the Winners Recital.
- 7. Several Winners Recitals will be held Sunday afternoon. Each winner must be available to perform one movement of their sonatina or one of their vocal pieces in the assigned recital on Sunday afternoon, or the student will be disqualified. The judges select the movement or song the winners will perform for all classes except for piano classes IV, V, and VI. Students representing piano classes IV-VI are required to perform the memorized movement in the Winners Recital. Winners and Honorable Mentions will receive trophies. Only winners will perform in the Winner Recitals, but Honorable Mentions are encouraged to attend the recital to receive their awards. Teachers should be present at their students' recital(s) on Sunday. Winning siblings might not perform in the same Winners Recital.
- 8. No student may repeat a performance of a given piece in subsequent years. The teacher is responsible for enforcing this rule
